



LONGEAR SUNFISH

Lepomis megalotis

Description:

- ◆ olive to rusty brown back
- ◆ yellow to orange-red belly
- ◆ blue-green bars on the sides of its head
- ◆ back and sides with specks of yellow-orange, emerald and blue
- ◆ elongated opercular flap gives the 'long ear' appearance
- ◆ females slightly smaller than males
- ◆ males are generally brighter and have a larger opercular flap
- ◆ 13-14 pectoral rays
- ◆ 9-10 anal rays

Size:

- ◆ up to 9.5 inches, usually 4-4.5 inches

Range:

- ◆ east to central North America; from southern Quebec and Ontario through the Eastern U.S. and west to Oklahoma, Texas and northeastern Mexico

Facts:

- ◆ often mistaken as a pumpkinseed
- ◆ likes vegetation in rocky and sandy pools of creeks and small to medium rivers

- ◇ spawn in groups
- ◇ males will guard the nest until the eggs have hatched
- ◇ favor slow to moderate flow in clear streams
- ◇ one female can lay over 22,000 eggs
- ◇ take 2-3 years to mature
